

What is Phonics?



Phonics is the teaching of reading by developing awareness of the sounds in words and the corresponding letters used to represent those sounds.

Children are also taught the correspondence between sounds and the letters that represent them.



Children are taught 44 phonemes (sounds) that make up all the sounds required for reading and spelling.

Terminology – A Quick Guide

- Phonemes Any one of the 44 sounds which make up words in the English language
- **Graphemes** How a phoneme is written down. There can be more than one way to spell a phoneme.



- Digraph When two letters make one sound d-u-ck
- Trigraph When three letters make one sound n-igh-t
- Helpful Words— words that are read by sight `the', `he', `she' etc.

(also referred to as Common Exception Words, tricky words etc)


Putting the sounds together in order to read it.

How we do it...

- 2 daily phonics sessions for all children set at the children's ability.
- An additional phonics session for individual's that require 'catch up'.
- Daily handwriting of the new phoneme taught that day.
- Daily opportunities to use new phonemes in their writing.
- Reading books home match phonemes taught that week.
- Weekly spelling match phonemes taught that week.
- Morning activities to practise previously taught phonemes.




Our Sessions...

- Session 2 chance to practice and apply new phoneme.


- Monday teach new phoneme



Why Non-sense Words?

- Every year I child in the country will be taking the phonics screening check in the same week in June.
- •WB 12th June 2023
- It is designed to give teachers and parents information on how your child is progressing in phonics and it will help to identify whether your child needs additional support.
- There are 2 sections in this 40 word check and it assesses phonic skills and knowledge learned through Reception and Year I.



Phonics Screening Checks

- The children will complete the check one at a time with their class teacher in a quiet area of the school.
- The screening will only take between 5–10 minutes with each child however the children are under no obligation to complete the task in any set amount of time.
- Once all children have completed the check, the data will be submitted.
 Pass rate in is normally around 32/33 out of 40.
- You will be notified whether your child has met the expected standard and if they don't, they will have the opportunity to retake the test in Year 2.

Help at Home

NEW

- Read regularly at home and comment in reading diary.
- Practise spelling for Friday's spelling test.
- When ready comprehension books.
 - Sound and word bag...
 - Phoneme mat.
 - Helpful words cards.
 - Phonics word lists.

Your child's reading pack should be brought to school every day. Staff will hear children read throughout the week and will change reading books on a Friday after all phonemes have been taught.
